AWARE AND CONNECTED

This Sunday, the Second Sunday of Easter concludes the Octave of Easter and we enter the remaining six weeks of the Easter Season leading to Pentecost. Our First and Second Readings over the coming Sundays address the growth of the early Church. The Gospel readings, all from John except for next Sunday's from Luke, develop the notion of discipleship in furthering the mission of Jesus under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. As Archbishop Christopher reflected in his Easter Vigil homily, the disciples were called to 'come and see' the empty tomb and then directed to 'go and tell' others. Faith leads to action.

Fair enough but what does this all mean in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic? First and foremost, what it has meant down through the ages: to savour and to manifest the presence and hope of the Risen Lord. However due to the pandemic we are under restrictions. So a perennial call is restricted by observance of what serves the common good. Yet in our time 'apart' from people, places and activities the Holy Spirit beckons anew, surely?

The eleventh century Jewish philosopher Solomon Ibn Gabriol (aka Avicebron) taught "In seeking wisdom, the first step is silence; the second, listening; the third, remembering; the fourth, practising; the fifth, teaching others." We can understandably hanker after what is absent and perhaps just endure the pandemic. Or, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit we can embrace being apart and listen anew to who we are and what we are called to be. With such openness a renewed sense of connection, peace and purpose will emerge. In other words, whatever the circumstance, the Risen Lord beckons. This was beautifully symbolised in the signing of the Easter Candle at the Easter Vigil last Saturday night. Atop the cross on the Easter Candle, into which are placed five incense studs representing the five wounds of Christ is the letter Alpha, the first letter of the Greek alphabet and at the foot of the cross is the 'Omega' or last letter. The Risen Lord unites all creation in new life. The year '2020' is written where the horizontal and vertical beams intersect. The Easter Candle was then lit from the Easter fire and processed into the Church with the congregation lighting candles from it symbolic of their rebirth in Christ. If not in liturgy then in the circumstances of our 'new normal', we are being called to walk in the light of the Risen Lord. Such trust is beautifully reflected in Reinhold Niebuhr's 'Serenity Prayer': God grant me serenity to accept the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can and wisdom to know the difference. Living one day at a time, enjoying one moment at a time, accepting hardship as a pathway to peace, taking, as Jesus did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it, trusting that You will make all

things right if I surrender to Your will, so that I may be reasonably happy in this life and supremely happy with You forever in the next.

So, with reference to this Sunday's readings we walk by faith not having the experience of the doubting Thomas who after a dramatic encounter with the wounds of the Risen Lord proclaims 'My Lord and my God!' However, the Gospel ends with the Risen Lord reassuring all of us: 'Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.' Faith lived in community is very supportive and very attractive (First Reading), and it endures in the midst of trials 'because you believe; and you are sure of the hope to which your faith looks forward, that is, the salvation of your souls' (Second Reading). Stay safe and stay connected.
