GOOD SHEPHERD SUNDAY – World Day of Vocations

Jesus is making counter cultural claims in today's Gospel. While kings were meant to be 'good shepherds' of their people, they were the exception sadly. Besides, shepherds were seen as immoral and irreligious, living alone and not caring for their women nor gathering with the religiously observant (John J. Pilch). Prevailing notions are transformed in Jesus.

In the verse following today's Gospel, Jesus makes a claim that would have sounded like an oxymoron: "I am the Good Shepherd" (In 10:11). Besides, the early Church at the time of writing of John's Gospel were distancing themselves from the Jewish synagogue and more especially failed leadership. They were looking to Jesus as their true or 'Good Shepherd'. To understand the imagery, we need to understand how shepherds operated back then: "During the day sheep grazed on the open hillsides under the watchful eye of their shepherds. At nightfall the shepherds led them down to large communal sheepfolds, where mingled sheep from a number of flocks could remain safe for the night with just one gatekeeper to watch over them. At daybreak, when the shepherds returned, each one would summon the sheep of the flock for which he was responsible. Recognising the voice of their shepherd, the sheep would follow his lead out to pasture through the gate of the fold" (Brendan Byrne SJ). At night thieves would try to enter the fold other than through the gate in an attempt to 'call' the sheep out. The thief, or those 'calls' contrary to our good, contrast with the voice of the Good Shepherd who cares for and protects. Jesus also identifies himself as "the Gate of the **sheepfold".** "If the sheep are to flourish, they have to come and go through the gate of the fold; if they stay within the fold, they will decline for lack of pasture. If they do not return to the fold but stay out in the hillsides all night, they will be at risk. So daily they have to come and go through the gate, which then becomes their means to both protection and growth" (Byrne). Responding to the voice of the Good Shepherd, we engage with life to the full 'through him, with him and in him', now and forever. Peter's call to 'repent' in our First Reading is a call to 'tune in' to where the Spirit is calling, coming back "to the shepherd and guardian of [our]

souls" (Second Reading), such that we can with confidence proclaim, "The Lord is my shepherd, there is nothing I shall want" (Responsorial Psalm).

It is fitting therefore that Good Shepherd Sunday is also World Day of Vocations. We are all called or have a vocation by virtue of our baptism. "Every vocation is born of that gaze of love with which the Lord came to meet us, perhaps even at a time when our boat was being battered by the storm. We will succeed in discovering and embracing our vocation once we open our hearts in gratitude and perceive the passage of God in our lives" (Message for World Day of Prayer for Vocations, 2020). All vocations are to the good of the Church's mission. Ministerial priesthood and consecrated life offer a much needed service and witness but always in solidarity with all other vocations. I encourage you to intentionally, regularly and insistently pray for and to foster a sense of vocation in yourself and amongst all the faithful, not the least your own family and loved ones. Only then might we begin to address the so-called vocation crisis in a considered manner.
