AN INCLUSIVE VISION

Times change. So too our perspective, even daily. Our mood in response to a minus morning is often in sharp contrast to enjoyment of later autumn sun. Today's readings reflect a developing perspective as the Gospel message is taken beyond Jerusalem under the influence of the Holy Spirit. The distinction in the First Reading between the baptised and the coming of the Holy Spirit, which we now appropriate as the sacraments of baptism and confirmation, originated in the distinction between the initial reception of the Holy Spirit and "a more (existential) 'Pentecostal' awareness of the gift" (Brendan Byrne SJ). Again, the continuing farewell discourse from John's Gospel contrasts the immediate and longer-term understanding of Jesus 'going away' (in death and later return to the Father) and his 'return' (in resurrection and at the end of time). Further, John contrasts those who cannot see him after he goes away ('the world' or non-believers) and those who will 'see' him and experience his risen presence in community. To assist them, he promises to send 'another Paraclete' or one to comfort, support and challenge them. In that experience love is foundational. "What the Gospel is saying is that when the community is indeed one where love prevails, the atmosphere of love that it experiences is nothing other than a sharing in the communion of love that is the Godhead" (Byrne).

A challenge for the early Church was to see that sharing in the communion with the Godhead called one beyond the confines of one's own mob. All are called to experience 'the communion of love that is the Godhead'.

Two millennia later and we ask whether our vision is big enough? Are we still too exclusive? 'The Universal Christ' is the title of a recent book by Franciscan Fr Richard Rohr (2019). Surely the ongoing challenge of climate change and the COVID-19 pandemic affirm the connectedness of *all* creation. Salvation in Christ is both a material and metaphysical reality. Three quotes at the beginning of Rohr's book can both challenge and comfort us in the search for an inclusive worldview:

"The only really absolute mysteries in Christianity are the self-communication of God in the depths of existence — which we call grace, and in history — which we call Christ" (Fr. Karl Rahner, Jesuit priest and theologian, 1904-1984). Again, "I do not worship matter. I worship the God of matter, who became matter for my sake and deigned to inhabit matter, who worked out my salvation through matter. I will not cease from honouring that matter which works my

salvation" (St John Damascene, 675-753). And, "No despair of ours can alter the reality of things, nor stain the joy of the cosmic dance, which is always there" (Thomas Merton, 1915-1968).

Finally, as if to summarise his thought and experience, Rohr dedicates his book thus: "I dedicate this book to my beloved fifteen-year-old black Lab, Venus, whom I had to release to God while beginning to write this book. Without any apology, lightweight theology, or fear of heresy, I can appropriately say that Venus was also Christ for me."

We commit to your intercession all members of our community, beginning with the weakest ones, from the unborn to the sick, the disabled and the elderly.

We commit to you our families, our young and old, and all who are vulnerable, those who are quarantined or anxious.

We entrust to your Immaculate Heart those who have lost their livelihood or employment, our pastors and other essential service workers, and our leaders at this time.

We implore your intercession especially for the protection of doctors and nurses and those who minister to the contagious sick in this crisis.

Reign over us Mother of God and teach us how to make the Heart of Jesus reign in triumph in us and around us, as it has reigned and triumphed in you!
