The Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) meets on the first Wednesday of each month (except January). Its members are very conscious of the role of the PPC. In brief, the council works in collaboration with our parish priest, Fr. John, to nurture the parish community as followers of Jesus Christ.

Items presently on its' agenda are:

- How can we be more inclusive as a parish? For example, different cultural feast days.
- Parish Feast Day Sunday 6 August. After the 9.30am mass, the parish hospitality took the lead in providing hot soup and, or cuppa, in the parish centre.
- Guest speakers.
- Parish Dinner will be held in November to support the work of Vinnies with the homeless in Canberra.
- Goulburn Day Trip to visit the extensively restored former cathedral of Ss Peter and Paul, Goulburn, Monday 11 September. The cathedral was blessed and opened by Cardinal Moran (and nine other Archbishops / Bishops) on 29 June 1890. (The first mass celebrated at Goulburn was in an inn in 1833).

Suggestions from parishioners are very welcome. Check out the photos of PPC members in the foyer.



Year of the Holy Spirit

Parish Finances - John Eyers

Now that we have just one collection at each parish mass, 30% of parishioners' contributions goes to a fund which supports all the clergy of the archdiocese, and 70% goes into an account for paying other expenses of this parish. Those proportions of 30% and 70% are set by the archdiocese.

While our finances are currently healthy – a surplus of income over expenses, and a substantial reserve – there's a gradual trend of income declining as regular mass-goers and regular contributors become fewer.



However, Fr John, with advice from us in the finance council, has agreed on terms for the Latin mass community's use of the church in Garran which have freed the parish for the time being from most of the expenses of owning it. We also have under review long-term options for the presbytery and will keep parishioners informed and consulted as ideas turn into plans.

Whatever the future of those two buildings, there will remain the core expenses of the Holy Trinity church, the parish centre, and a parish office with a secretary, plus our share of supporting Fr. John and the other clergy of the archdiocese. So, we continue to be grateful for parishioners' generous contributions to meet the parish's expenses.
