TO SERVE NOT TO BE SERVED

Jesus enters Jerusalem on a donkey. He is acclaimed by his followers but those in power see it as a challenge. The mode of his entry is in keeping with the prophecy of Zechariah. It was a symbolic gesture. He comes to serve, not the like the religious and political leaders who sought to be served (Matt 20:28) and were threatened by him. The time of his entry to Jerusalem was not without tension. As many gathered for Passover, the population endured the occupying Romans and their unpopular taxes and the allied of fear of terrorism and suspicion of revivalist religious movements. There are parallels of sorts with our concerns about interest rates and climate change, talk of war to our north and refugees fleeing conflict in Ukraine and Myanmar. However, a particular issue for Matthew is the shedding of the innocent blood of Jesus. Our First Reading from Isaiah, along with the other Servant Songs of Isaiah read during Holy Week, provide "the 'script' for the otherwise totally unforeseen sufferings of the Messiah (Luke 24:27, 44-45; Acts 8:30-35)" (Brendan Byrne). The one who is totally innocent will die a horrible death. His 'obedience unto death' "is absolutely continuous with the divine outpouring of love that led to the incarnation of the one whose nature was divine" (Byrne). Nonetheless, in keeping with the biblical tradition, the heinous spilling of innocent blood is a problem Matthew seeks to account for. He looks to Judas who betrayed Jesus and later suicided in despair and Pilate who declared himself "innocent of this man's blood" (27:24), though he is not. Finally, the people accept responsibility, "His blood be upon us and upon our children" (27:25). This verse has caused more suffering than any other in the scriptures. It would be a gross

misinterpretation to see it calling down a perennial curse on the Jews. Rather, Matthew is writing soon after the Romans destruction of Jerusalem (70AD), and, with many others at that time, he was seeking a reason for that disaster. "For Matthew the reason is that the citizens of Jerusalem, urged on by their leaders, called down upon themselves 'and their children' responsibility for the innocent blood of Jesus. 'Their children' refers strictly to the coming generation – the generation that would be in mature years at the time when Jerusalem fell to the Romans. There is absolutely no suggestion that the responsibility should somehow continue or that it should adhere to the Jewish people as a whole. This needs to be made expressly clear" (ibid). Meanwhile, as Jesus did in his ministry and on entering Jerusalem, let us enter this Holy Week-Easter open to what God has done and seeks to do in and through us.
