TO FOLLOW IS TO SERVE

I heard it said that many parents today seek to be friends with their children rather than parents. A moot point, no doubt. What is not in doubt is that the attitude towards children today is markedly different to that of Jesus' setting. Back then if a child survived birth (thirty percent did not), sixty percent were dead by age sixteen due to disease and

poor hygiene. "Within the family and community, the child had next to no status. A minor child was considered equal to a slave. Only after reaching maturity did a child become a free person with rights to inherit the family estate. . . Children are loved because they provide "social security" for parents. Obviously if they survive to adulthood, they also assure family continuity" (John J Pilch). It is in terms of that cultural context that Jesus welcomes a child to teach his still confused followers that his life and mission is not about being served, as the conventional understanding of the Messiah would have it, but of serving; culminating in the supreme service of the cross (10:45). Jesus wants to flip the tables, he wants to usher in what would be the equivalent of a Copernican revolution for his followers: the truth of the matter is the very opposite of what you presume to be the case. In effect, he puts this question to his disciples: "Is God to be thought of as an extra-terrestial supreme Ruler to whom nothing but fear and service is due? Or is the God revealed by [me] a God whose primary gesture towards human beings is that of One who serves, One who comes among us in the guise of a child? (Brendan Byrne). Moreover, in a highly stratified society they would immediately understand that to welcome Jesus with the status of a child requires them to put aside adult self-importance and accept the status of one who serves too. In the same vein, earlier in the week Pope Francis said at the closing Mass of the International Eucharistic Congress in Budapest, Hungary: "Let us allow Jesus, the living bread, to heal us of our self-absorption, open our hearts to self-giving, liberate us from our rigidity and self-concern, free us from the paralysing slavery of defending our image, and inspire us to follow him wherever he would lead us." Communally, the church afforded a particular status by Roman Emperor Constantine (313AD) is being undermined by societal change and the sexual abuse crisis. "The pain that goes along with stripping of status and honour is close to that experienced by the disciples of Jesus as they struggled both to hear and to resist what he was saying. Like them, we are all on the way to Jerusalem with Jesus" (Byrne). One hopes that the challenges arising will be canvassed and prayerfully discerned at next month's initial meeting of the Plenary Council (3-10 Oct). Pray for those who gather. More immediately, pray for a deeper yet life-giving awareness of the need to serve after the model of Jesus.
