A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Because you have been faithful over a few things, enter into the joy of the Lord.

Jesus spoke this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a man on his way abroad who summoned his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to a third one; each in proportion to his ability. Then he set out. The man who had received the five talents promptly went and traded with them and made five more. The man who had received two made two more in the same way. But the man who had received one went off and dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. Now a long time after, the master of those servants came back and went through his accounts with them. The man who had received the five talents came forward bringing five more. "Sir", he said "you entrusted me with five talents; here are five more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Next the man with the two talents came forward. "Sir." he said "you entrusted me with two talents; here are two more that I have made." His master said to him, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you have shown you can be faithful in small things, I will trust you with greater; come and join in your master's happiness." Last came forward the man who had the one talent. "Sir," said he "I had heard you were a hard man, reaping where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered; so I was

afraid, and I went off and hid your

talent in the ground. Here it is; it was yours, you have it back." But his master answered him, "You wicked and lazy servant! So you knew that I reap where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered? Well then, you should have deposited my money with the bankers, and on my return I would have recovered my capital with interest. So now, take the talent from him and give it to the man who has the five talents. For to everyone who has will be given more, and he will have more than enough; but from the man who has not, even what he has will be taken away. As for this good-for-nothing servant, throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth."

## **REFLECTION** by Fr Michael Tate **Befriending Time**

God's plan for human happiness is mostly frustrated by a good person burying his or her personality traits, what one might call one's talents, which is really to bury oneself and to become invisible. In the old language of my schoolboy catechism, we should be concerned not just with sins of commission, but with sins of omission - failure of courage, failure to take risks, failure to put everything on the line with the personality and the moment in time given to you and to me.

As Shakespeare says in Julius Caesar: 'There is a tide in the affairs of men which, taken at the flood, leads on to fortune; omitted, all the voyage of their life is bound in stillness and in miseries.'

The Divine Tide is flowing through human history. We should trust ourselves to that tide which can carry us to the shores of Heaven. Failure to take risks leads to Hellish stillness and miseries. We could pause for a moment to pray that we might use our talents so as to hear: 'Well done, good and faithful servant ... come and join in your Master's happiness.'

# 33rd SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME-



When we hear the word talent, we are tempted to think of artists, people who are skilled in acting, singing, and playing different musical instrument like guitar, violin, piano and the likes. We also think of the world of sports, especially gymnastics. At the time of Jesus talent meant a legal tender. This is implied in the parable of the talent as presented by Mathew in this weekend's

gospel. Talent could also mean a natural aptitude or skill equal to a birth right. Everyone has a talent.

In the parable of the talent, Jesus presented the image of the kingdom in the master who called his servants and entrusted them with assets equal to their human capacities. five, two and one. He hoped that upon returning from oversees, the individual servant would invest their assets accordingly and gain reasonable profits. Upon his return, the first two servants reported the gains made from their assets. The third servant who was crippled by fear buried his talent for fear of losing. What a wasted time, treasure, talent, and trust?

The master was delighted by the diligence and industriousness of the two servants who traded and made gains with their trusted talents. However, he was disappointed with the third servant for betraying the trust imposed on him by not using his talent. Like the three servants, entrusted with talents, everyone is born with a special gift, a unique talent that is yours and yours alone. We are gifted by God with different talents, capacities, capabilities, and opportunities for the common good (1Corinth. 12.1f) of the community, especially as we celebrate 2020 NAIDOC Week.

What is my talent? What am I doing with my talent to ensure the good of all in the family, in the school and in the community? The example of the two servants who used their talent fruitfully, challenges us to identify our talents and potentials and use them to enhance the community, knowing that usefulness is the rent we pay for living on earth.

Unfortunately, many human talents remain untapped and end up in the cemetery, because many talented people failed to develop and use their talents like the third servant in the parable for the fear of failure, criticism, lack of resiliency, courage and self-confidence, besides laziness, self-doubt, procrastination, giving up to distractions, anxiety, and depression.

May the parable of the talent, be a source of motivation to us, as we recognise, develop and use our talents and baptismal gifts.

We Remember Always November is a special month for remembering who we are as a people and who we are as a church. On November 1st we gathered to celebrate the Solemnity of All Saints


- a day which honours the more obscure saints as well as the saints each of us have known. On November 2nd, we observed All Souls' Day.
