#### First Reading Ex 16:2-4. 12-15

A reading from the book of Exodus I will rain bread from heaven upon you.

The whole community of the sons of Israel began to complain against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness and said to them, 'Why did we not die at the Lord's hand in the land of Egypt, when we were able to sit down to pans of meat and could eat bread to our hearts content! As it is, you have brought us to this wilderness to starve this whole company to death!' Then the Lord said to Moses, 'Now I will rain down bread for you from the heavens. Each day the people are to go out and gather the day's portion; I propose to test them this way to see whether they will follow my law or not.' 'I have heard the complaints of the sons of Israel. Say this to them, "Between the two evenings you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have bread to your hearts content. Then you will learn that I, the Lord, am your God." And so it came about: quails flew up in the evening, and they covered the camp; in the morning there was a coating of dew all round the camp. When the coating of dew lifted, there on the surface of the desert was a thing delicate, powdery, as fine as hoarfrost on the ground. When they saw this, the sons of Israel said to one another, 'What is that?' not knowing what it was. 'That' said Moses to them 'is the bread the Lord gives you to eat.'

Whoever comes to me will never be hungry; whoever believes in me will never thirst.

When the people saw that neither Jesus nor his disciples were there, they got into boats and crossed to Capernaum to look for Jesus. When they found him on the other side, they said to him, 'Rabbi, when did you come here?' Jesus answered: 'I tell you most solemnly, you are not looking for me because you have seen the signs but because you had all the bread you wanted to eat. Do not work for food that cannot last, but work for food that endures to eternal life, the kind of food the Son of Man is offering you, for on him the Father, God himself, has set his seal. Then they said to him, 'What must we do if we are to do the works that God wants?' Jesus gave them this answer, 'This is working for God: you must believe in the one he has sent.' So they said, 'What sign will you give to show us that we should believe in you? What work will you do? Our fathers had manna to eat in the desert; as scripture says: He gave them bread from heaven to eat.' Jesus answered: 'I tell you most solemnly, it was not Moses who gave you bread from

heaven, it is my Father who gives you the bread from heaven, the true bread; for the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world.' 'Sir,' they said 'give us that bread always.' Jesus answered: 'I am the bread of life. He who comes to me will never be hungry; he who believes in me will never thirst.'

#### **REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate** Who can satisfy human appetites?

Some religions, and even strands of Catholicism, try to suppress appetites in order to achieve some 'out-of-thisworld' liberation. But appetites are good things, telling us what we humans need as bodily, social, spiritual beings. They provide a reality check against our tendency to think that salvation is exclusively about the soul. Our appetites for food and drink, for affection and companionship, for the truth about the Big Picture of our life journey, need to be satisfied or we disintegrate in various ways. Our Lord Jesus Christ proclaims in today's Gospel that He is the total satisfaction of our deepest human appetites: 'I am the Bread from Heaven which gives life to the world.' That 'Life' is nothing less than participation in Divine Life, existing in the Big Picture in the way God intended. That is the nourishment offered not to a particular tribe or ethnic group, but to the whole of humanity, indeed to the whole of creation. We could take a moment to pray for faith to recognise that the bread brought up at the Offertory is truly transformed: no longer short term food like manna in the desert, but 'the Bread of Life', the Real Presence of the One who nourishes our humanity, indeed who gives Life to the world.

■low many of us give up too soon when we don't get what we want? The grumbling of the people in the desert can sound like us at times! How do we handle a grumbling person? Do we forget sometimes that we may be the grumbler without noticing



The Israelites in the desert were not complaining about Moses but about

God. How often is our target God? There is a lot to complain about these days but let's not forget that it is **not a time** for us to give up and lose our faith. At times we can justify ourselves by praying and not looking at the reality! God did provide for the people in the desert! The manna was a **sign** of more to come. Is our faith strong enough to know that God does provide? Yes we may be being tested, but not beyond our means. We have so much more than the Israelites! We have the words of Jesus in the Scriptures that constantly urges us on. "Believe. Trust in Me. Have faith. Stop worrying about yourselves all the time"

#### LIVING FAITH IN THE EVERYDAY

#### A REFLECTION ON THE PROBLEM OF SUFFERING AND EVIL

Perhaps that is the most difficult religious question of all time, especially during this pandemic and there have been countless attempts to answer it.

Christians believe that what is ultimately at stake is human freedom and God's respect for it. God gives us freedom and (unlike most everyone else) refuses to violate it, even when it would seem beneficial to do so.

That leaves us in a lot of pain at times, but, as Jesus reveals, God is not so much a rescuing God as a redeeming one. God does not protect us from pain, but instead enters it and ultimately redeems it. That might sound simplistic in the face of real death and evil, but it is not.

We see a powerful illustration of this in Jesus' reaction to the death of Lazarus. When Mary and Martha send Jesus a message telling him the "the man you love" is gravely ill, Jesus doesn't rush off to see him. By the time Jesus gets they, Lazarus has died. Martha and Mary are naturally upset and say to Jesus: "If you had been here, my brother would not have died!" Basically, their question is: "Where were you? Why didn't you come and heal him?" Jesus does not answer her question but instead assures her that Lazarus will live in some deeper way.

Mary and Martha both ask Jesus the universal, timeless question about suffering and God's seeming absence. Her query - "Where were you when my brother died?" - asks that question for everyone: Where is God when innocent people suffer?

Curiously, Jesus does not engage the question in theory. Instead, he becomes distressed and asks: "Where have you put him?" And when they offer to show him, he begins to weep. This is Jesus' answer to suffering: He enters into peoples' helplessness and pain.

Sometimes the only answer to the question of suffering and evil is the one Jesus gave to Mary and Martha – shared helplessness, shared distress, and shared tears, with no attempt to try to explain God's seeming absence, but rather a trusting that, because God is all-loving and all-powerful, in the end all will be well and our pain will someday be redeemed in God's embrace.
