'Were not all ten made clean? The other nine, where are they? It seems that no one has come back to give praise to God, except this foreigner.' And he said to the man, 'Stand up and go on your way. Your faith has saved you.'

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REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

Leprosy, AIDS and Salvation

Like the other nine lepers, the Samaritan was cured of his skin disease. Unlike the other nine, he thanked Jesus and expressed faith in Jesus as the agent of his divine healing. Only to him did Jesus say: 'Your faith has brought you salvation.' So, 'salvation' is evidently more than physical cure. Every aspect of this man's personality, bodily, socially, relationship with God, was

made whole. Being brought to this 'holistic' situation we call 'salvation'. This Gospel assures us that there is nothing which makes me 'taboo' to Jesus. Jesus is only too willing to reach out to that part of me which is dis-eased, ill-at-ease with myself, other people, creation, or God. Having faith in Him allows the full force of His love to heal me, to take effect.

We could pause for a moment to pray that we might join the Samaritan walking along the road to final salvation, praising God.

Thanksgiving for what is!

I have a book mark from Caritas that shows a very joyful image of a little African girl dancing and smiling; she seem so full of gratitude despite the fact that she has an amputated leg and she is dancing on a crutch. When we see such images we see life from a new perspective. It reminds me of the quote from Helen Keller who was blind from birth yet led a purposeful life full of thankfulness: 'When one door of happiness closes, another opens; but often we look so long at the closed door that we do not see the one which has been opened for us.

Thankfulness for what has already been given is the foundation for hoping for what is not yet. As we look

at the harvest of our blessings in our heart let us marvel at the abundance and be thankful for what is.

Jesus heals and commends a grateful Foreigner.

In today's Gospel [Luke 17: 11- 19] Jesus heals ten lepers. In Jesus' time 'Leprosy' referred to skin diseases of various kinds and victims were classified as ritually unclean and even persons who touched them were also considered ritually unclean. They had to live away from their family, friends and community. It was a totally isolating disease, with devastating consequences for their families and themselves. Unable to work they had to depend on the charity of others to survive. If their condition improved they were re-admitted to the community only after the priests declared them ritually clean.

The Gospel tells us today that Jesus heals 10 lepers sending them off to the priests to be declared ritually clean. The Gospel goes on: One of them [the foreigner] when he saw he was healed turned back praising God at the top of his voice and falling on his face thanked Jesus. He recognises the effects of God's healing actions. This act of thankfulness has the effect of leaving the relationship open - open for God to do more for him, should Jesus choose to do so. Having acknowledged he has been healed Jesus declares 'his faith has saved him'. Like this foreigner we are invited to open our hearts and eyes to see the signs of God at work in our own lives and in the world around us. To allow that sense of God at work in us & to deepen our faith in the practical possibilities of the Kingdom.

'St Ignatius Loyola told Jesuits never to omit from their day time to recall with thankfulness every good thing that happened in the day. Gratitude oils the wheel of life. What have I taken for granted this day, for which I now can be grateful?' [Sacred Space Sept 20221 Marie Weatherall



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
