

Tradition of the Apricot Blossom Tree

For a long time, apricot flowers have been admired by everyone in Vietnam, symbolizing beauty and elegance. Whenever the apricot blossoms bloom, people's hearts rejoice, a sign that spring is coming. Vietnam has peach blossom in the North and apricot blossom the South. The yellow color of apricot flowers has long been considered the color of prosperity. Bringing an apricot blossom tree home on the occasion of Tết (Lunar New Year) means wishing for a prosperous New Year. According to tradition, a house with apricot blossoms blooming in the New Year will be blessed with prosperity - the more petals per flower, the more prosperity! The apricot blossom tree's roots go deep into the ground and thus can help the tree withstand extreme weather conditions. Therefore, apricot blossom tree also symbolizes the virtue of patience and resilience, the

perseverance of the Vietnamese people in general. The apricot tree is also a symbol of nobility and generosity. The golden apricot blossoms in full bloom in the spring season also signify joy, jubila-

First Reading Isaiah 8:23 - 9:3

In days past the Lord humbled the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in days to come he will confer glory on the Way of the Sea on the far side of Jordan, province of the nations.

The people that walked in darkness has seen a great light; on those who live in a land of deep shadow a light has shone.

You have made their gladness greater, you have made their joy increase; they rejoice in your presence as men rejoice at harvest time, as men are happy when they are dividing the spoils.

For the yoke that was weighing on him, the bar across his shoulders, the rod of his oppressor, these you break as on the day of Midian.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 26:1, 4, 13-14

R. The Lord is my light and my salvation.

The Lord is my light and my help; whom shall I fear?
The Lord is the stronghold of my life; before whom shall I shrink? R.

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 1:10-13, 17

I appeal to you, brothers, for the sake of our Lord Jesus Christ, to make up the differences between you, and instead of disagreeing among yourselves, to be united again in your belief and practice. From what Chloe's people have been telling me, my dear brothers, it is clear that there are serious differences among you. What I mean are all these slogans that you have, like: 'I am for Paul', 'I am for Apollo', 'I am for Cephas', 'I am for Christ'. Has Christ been parcelled out? Was it Paul that was crucified for you? Were you baptised in the name of Paul? For Christ did not send me to baptise, but to preach the Good News, and not to preach that in the terms of philosophy in which the crucifixion of Christ cannot be expressed.

Gospel Acclamation Matthew 4:23

Alleluia, alleluia! Jesus preached the Good News of the kingdom and healed all who were sick. Alleluia!

Gospel Matthew 4:12-17

Hearing that John had been arrested Jesus went back to Galilee, and leaving Nazareth he went and settled in Capernaum, a lakeside town on the borders of Zebulun and Naphtali. In this way the prophecy of Isaiah was to be fulfilled: Land of Zebulun! Land of Naphtali! Way of the sea on the far side of Jordan, Galilee of the nations! The people that lived in darkness has seen a great light; on those who dwell in the land and shadow of death a light has dawned. From that moment Jesus began his preaching with the message, 'Repent, for the kingdom of

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heaven is close at hand'.
